Ways to Lower Your Electric Bills This Winter

Winter is here, and we have seen frigid temperatures in our area. With these colder temperatures come increased electricity bills. While your winter bills might not be as high as your summer ones, it can still cost you some extra money that you could be saving.

Luckily, there are some things you can do this winter to help reduce your monthly bill and stay comfortable.



Dim your lights. We are prone to spending more on lighting in our homes in the winter. Since days are shorter, lights are getting turned on earlier for tasks like reading and cooking. Make it a point to turn the lights off every time you are not using a room. Or make the switch to LED light bulbs to reduce your energy usage. Another simple solution is to use task lighting at night; consider using a desk lamp or side table lamps instead of overhead lighting.

Upgrade your thermostat. Upgrading your thermostat will let you customize your heating schedule to save money. You can save up to 10% on your heating bill just by setting your thermostat down a couple of degrees.

Insulate your home. If your home is typically cold, check your insulation. You may need to replace some or all. Investment in insulation in your home will pay off in your monthly electric bill for years to come.

Let the sunshine in. Take advantage of the world's best furnace—the sun! Open your curtains and blinds in the daytime and let the sun warm your home.

Four Tips for Winter Safety

It's no surprise that the winter months bring an increased potential for fire risks and electrical safety hazards. This makes sense because consumers use additional electrical devices and appliances during the coldest months, like space heaters, electric blankets, and portable generators.

The National Fire Protection Association estimates that 47,700 home fires occur each year in the U.S. due to electrical failure or malfunction, which results in 418 deaths, 1,570 injuries, and \$1.4 billion in property damage annually. This winter, safeguard your loved ones and your home with these electrical safety tips from the Electrical Safety Foundation International.

Don't overload outlets. Overloaded outlets are a major cause of residential fires. Avoid using extension cords or multi-outlet converters for appliance connections—plug appliances directly into a wall outlet. If you're relying heavily on extension cords in general, you may need additional outlets to address your needs. Contact a qualified electrician to inspect your home and add new outlets.

Never leave space heaters unattended. If you're using a space heater, turn it off before leaving the room. Make sure to place heaters at least three feet away from flammable items. Space heaters can take a toll on your energy bills. If you're using them throughout your home, it may be time to upgrade your home heating system. Check out JOEMC's Home Energy Calculators by visiting joemc.com/energy-center/home-energy-calculators and see what your space heater is costing you to run.

Inspect heating pads and electric blankets. These items cause nearly 500 fires every year. Electric blankets that are more than ten years old create additional risks for a fire hazard. Inspect your electric blankets and heating pads – look for dark, charred, or frayed spots, and make sure the electrical cord is not damaged. Please do not place any items on top of a heating pad or electric blanket, and never fold them when in use.



Use portable generators safely. Unfortunately, winter storms can cause prolonged power outages, which means many consumers will use portable generators to power their homes. Never connect a standby generator to your home's electrical system. For portable generators, plug appliances directly into the outlet provided on the generator. Start the generator first, before you plug-in appliances. Run it in a well-ventilated area outside your home. The carbon monoxide it generates is deadly, so keep it away from your garage, doors, windows, and vents. For more on generator safety, visit joemc.com/customer-service/ safety/generator-safety.



CHOCOLATE COVERED PRETZEL RODS

Prep Time 10 mins Total Time 20 mins

Ingredients

- 16 oz pretzel rods
- 12 oz chocolate chips semisweet, (dark or white chocolate), or candy melts
- Sprinkles

Instructions

- 1. Line two large baking sheets with wax or parchment paper.
- 2. Set up your workstation with all the sprinkles you are going to use. Place about ½ cup of colored melting candy (for the drizzle) in heavy-duty zip-top bags.
- 3. Use a double boiler and melt chocolate chips. Stir occasionally until fully melted.
- Dip the pretzel rods into melted chocolate and cover as much of the pretzel as you want.
- 5. Place on prepared baking sheet. Sprinkle with sprinkles. If using candy melts, microwave melts in zip-top bags for about 20-25 seconds, squish the candy around until melted and smooth. Cut a tiny cut corner from each of the bags and drizzle.
- 6. Let set. Store in an air-tight container.

Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month

Use wool or rubber dryer balls in the clothes dryer to reduce drying time and static.

Wool dryer balls can also absorb extra moisture. These are an efficient alternative to dryer sheets, which can create buildup on the dryer's filter and reduce air circulation. If you prefer dryer sheets, scrub the filter once a month to remove buildup.
