Nominate a Veteran from Our Community for a No Barriers Expedition



ur local community is home to many veterans, many of whom are living with a disability. For the third year—Jones-Onslow EMC,

in conjunction with one of our financial partners, is searching for disabled veterans from its service territory to nominate for the No Barriers Warriors Expedition Program, a Colorado-based nonprofit organization.

The program, sponsored by Co-Bank, provides expeditions that mentally and

physically challenge veterans on outdoor excursions through mountaineering, rafting, and rock climbing. Co-Bank covers the full cost for participants, including meals, gear, and travel expenses. These five-day expeditions offer veterans an opportunity to challenge limitations (both real and perceived) and to create a network of support that can last a lifetime.

Spring is Here...

The first official day of spring comes the middle of this month and with it a fresh opportunity to find ways to save energy and money.

Service your air conditioner.

Easy maintenance, such as routinely replacing or cleaning air filters, can lower your cooling system's energy consumption by up to 15 percent. Also, the first day of spring could serve as a reminder to check your air conditioner's evaporator coil, which should be cleaned annually to ensure the system is performing at optimal levels.

Open windows. Opening windows creates a cross-wise breeze, allowing you to naturally cool your home

without switching on air conditioners. This is an ideal tactic in spring when temperatures are mild.

Cook outside. On warmer spring days, keep the heat out of your home by using an outdoor grill instead of indoor ovens.



Install window treatments. Energy-efficient window treatments or coverings such as blinds, shades, and films can slash heat gain when temperatures rise. These devices not only improve the look of your home but also reduce energy costs.

Caulk air leaks. Using low-cost caulk to seal cracks and openings in your home keeps warm air out...and cash in your wallet.


Bring in sunlight. During daylight hours, switch off artificial lights and use windows and skylights to brighten your home.

2020 Census: Why is it Important to Participate?

Results collected once a decade from Census studies help determine how billions of dollars in federal funding flow to states and individual communities each year for areas such as affordable housing, schools, hospitals, roads, emergency response, and more! So it's essential that everyone answer the Census!

he 2020 Census invitations begin in mid-March, with April 1 recognized as national Census Day. It's vital to list everyone living in your household on this date. You can choose to respond online, by phone or by mail. All information shared is protected and private. Please be aware that the Census will NOT ask questions about your social security number, bank, or credit card numbers, nor will it solicit money.

Questions that ARE asked on the Census include how many people live in your home, age and race, and whether your home is owned or rented. Census counts are mandated by the Constitution and conducted by the US Census Bureau, a non-partisan government agency.

It Pays to be a Member

Returning money back to our members is an important cooperative value and we hope you agree



that it's also a nice benefit of being a cooperative member.

uring the last week of February, your cooperative mailed a "green" letter to you, our members, concerning the authorization by your Board of Directors of a capital credits refund. There is a space provided for your signature and a

return envelope so you can mail it back to our office.

The name "capital credits" may sound complex but it's a simple concept. Capital credits are the annual margins—revenues minus expenses of the cooperative—which are allocated to each member based on their individual purchase and use of electricity. Until they're returned to members, capital credits are funds used as operating capital to invest in power lines, substations, and other electric system assets that provide all of the JOEMC members with reliable electricity. After using the money for a period of years to finance investments in electric facilities, it is returned to our members.

To assure your return of capital credits and the fiscal health of your cooperative, your Board of Directors has approved and put into place an equity management plan. The plan uses an industry best standard that looks at the percent of member equity to total assets. It includes a schedule for the regular return of member equity in the form of capital credits.

The equity plan also determines how much of the cooperative's investment in electric system assets will be covered through member capital and how much will be covered by long-term debt. Our goal is to balance member capital (equity) and debt in order to give members the lowest possible rates.

This year, the capital credit refund authorization (almost \$1.48 million) will be for members who received electric service from JOEMC during the years 1997 and 2019. These refunds will consist of 100% of the remaining allocated capital credits from 1997 and 25% of the allocated capital credits from 2019.

All active members who received service during the years mentioned above will receive their refund in the form of a "capital credit refund" on their electric bill. All inactive members who received service from the cooperative during those years will receive a capital credit check in the mail.

Corned Beef, & Swiss Mini Pot Pies

Ingredients:

- 8 oz thinly sliced cooked corned beef, coarsely chopped 1 cup shredded Swiss cheese
- 1 can (10 3/4 oz) condensed cream of mushroom soup 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 1 teaspoon caraway seeds (optional)
- 1 can (16.3 oz) Pillsbury™ Grands!™ Flaky Layers refrigerated biscuits

Directions:

1) Heat oven to 375°F. Spray 8 muffin cups with cooking spray.

- 2) In large bowl, mix corned beef, cheese, soup, mustard and caraway seed until well combined.
- 3) Separate dough into 8 biscuits. Press each biscuit to form 5½" round. Place ½ cup meat mixture in center of each round. Gently pull edges up and around filling, and place into muffin cups. Pull edges of dough over filling toward center; pleat and pinch dough gently to hold in place, leaving some of the filling exposed.
- 4) Bake 20 to 22 minutes or until biscuits are golden brown. Cool 1 minute; remove from pan.
