DOWN & DANGEROUS

With unpredictable weather being a common theme in Eastern North Carolina, we want you to know that downed power lines are a hazard that comes along with that—typically from high winds. Member safety is important at all times; however, it is crucial when there is a downed power line.

Here are a few safety tips to protect yourself and those around you should you see a downed power line.

- If you see a downed power line, move away from it and anything touching it. The ground around power lines up to 35 feet may be energized.
- Looking at it, you cannot tell whether a power line is energized; assume all downed lines are live.
- Do not attempt to move a downed power line or anything else in contact with it, even by using an object such as a broom. Even non-conductive materials like wood or cloth can conduct electricity if even slightly wet.
- Be aware of downed lines that may be covered up by debris or downed trees.
- If you find a downed power line, call **911** and Jones-Onslow EMC at **910-353-1940**.

The ground around downed power lines up to 35 feet may be energized.

Avoid high bills. Check your ductwork.



When was the last time you ventured into your home's crawl space or attic to inspect your HVAC system's ductwork?

If it has been a while, then now would be a good time to slip on some old clothes and have a peek at the condition of the ductwork in these seldom-seen areas. Ductwork should be inspected twice a year, once before you turn on your cooling system in the summer and once before you begin using your heating system in the winter.

Ducts often fall or become detached due to improper installation techniques. Mastic sealant, a flexible yet durable protective sealant, is the only thing that should be used to seal ducts to register boots and other connections. HVAC or duct tape should NOT be used. Over a period of time, these tapes will lose their adhesive properties allowing ductwork to fall, releasing the heated or air-conditioned air that you paid for, under your home or into the attic. So, please take a few minutes to survey your ductwork before it costs you high energy bills this winter.



5-INGREDIENT POTATO SOUP

- 4 slices bacon, halved
- 6 medium scallions, thinly sliced, white and green parts separated
- 2 lbs. frozen hash browns or peeled and cubed Russet potatoes
- 3 cups of half-and-half or whole milk
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- ½ teaspoon kosher salt
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 1. Place the bacon in a large soup pot and cook on medium heat until browned and crisp, about 8 minutes. Transfer the bacon to paper towels to drain.
- 2. Add the white parts of the scallions to the pot. Sauté until fragrant, about 1 minute. Add the potatoes and cook, stirring occasionally, for 5 minutes. Add the half-and-half or milk and salt and bring to a simmer. Cook, stirring occasionally, until the potatoes are soft, about 10 minutes. Meanwhile, crumble the bacon.
- 3. At this point, mash with a potato masher or purée with an immersion blender into your desired consistency. Taste. Season with salt and pepper as needed. Spoon into bowls and top with cheese, scallion greens, and bacon.
