INGREDIENTS

- · 6 cups fried chicken*
- ¾ cup mayonnaise
- · 3 tablespoons sweet pickle juice
- ¾ cup roughly chopped sweet pickle chips (we used Mt. Olive Sweet Heat Bread & Butter)
- 4 cups iceberg lettuce, roughly chopped
- 2-3 stalks celery, diced (about 34 cup)
- 2-3 green onions, dark and green parts, finely chopped
- ½ teaspoon black pepper
- · Hot sauce, a few shakes (optional)
- · 2 packages (8-count) top split rolls
- · Chives, snipped as a garnish (optional)

*Fry your own chicken, or buy some. (We used Bojangles' 4-piece dark meat fried chicken and 6 tenders, including skin.)
You can also use prepared frozen cooked

tenders.

- Chop up chicken into small pieces. In a separate bowl, combine remaining ingredients except rolls. Fold chicken into mixture. Refrigerate for at least 30 minutes.
- When ready to serve or pack your picnic, stuff salad into rolls and keep safely cooled.

A well-designed landscape can add beauty to your home and reduce home heating and cooling costs. Plant deciduous trees with high, spreading crowns to the south of your home to block sunlight in the summer and reduce the need for air conditioning. Deciduous trees lose their leaves in the winter, allowing sunlight to warm your home.

Plant evergreen trees and shrubs with low crowns to block winter winds. Dense evergreen trees and shrubs planted to the north and northwest are the most common type of windbreak and can help lower energy used for home heating.
